JANUARY CRAWL REVIEW

On cold and sunny January 24 members of the Hilbus Chapter gathered in South Baltimore to visit two unique pipe organs. The first visit was to Christ Lutheran Church. Jonathan Parker, assistant organist, greeted us as we enter the sanctuary to see Andover, Opus 114.



The organ cases of this new instrument are stunning. One notices the fine stenciling of Marylou Davis, an expert in 19th century American stenciling. The cases are cantilevered into the chancel as far as possible without

intruding on the worship space and line of sight views of the front window. The manual divisions, Great, Swell, and Positiv are located on the left hand side and have suspended tracker action while the Pedal is located on the right hand side and electrically operated. Because of the chancel installation, an acoustical situation demanded a division in the rear gallery to fully support congregational singing.



This division has a full Principal Chorus, a string, flutes, a Trumpet and a large solo reed: the Tromba. It has its own two manual console and with some judicious duplexing and unification of the Bourdon and Trumpet turned it into an effective and versatile instrument on its own. The front organ can be played from the two manual console through couplers and general pistons. Jonathan Parker played a short recital on the organ demonstrating various registrations of both the front and gallery organs. Then various Hilbus Chapter members took turns playing either the chancel organ or the gallery instrument. I found the instrument very satisfying to play. Each and every stop played alone was beautiful noting the skill of the Andover voicers and tonal director John Morlock. I particularly like the mixtures because they added to the principal chorus and were by no means strident. When playing a Bach fugue I could hear each voice as it enter the composition. The many reeds are modeled after various past organ builders including Cavaille-Coll, Hook and Hastings, and Cliquot.




Hilbus members then walked to the Cross Street Market and ate at various venues in the market. It is always so nice to talk and find out what is happening in the organ world in Baltimore, Washington, D.C. and Northern Virginia.

We then walked a few block down Charles Street to the Church of the Advent. This Anglo-Catholic parish was started as a mission of Grace and St. Peters Anglo-Catholic located in the Mount Vernon area of Baltimore. Fr. Christopher Keene greeted us and spoke about the history of the church building and history of the pipe organ. Baltimore builder Adam Stein built the original pipe organ. It was moved into the present church building and electrified by Mudler-Hunter of Philadelphia, Pennsylvania.



The original instrument was 13 ranks and the electrified instrument is 13 ranks with a stop tab on the Great manual for an 8' Trumpet. This stop was never added. Many members sat down and played the instrument and because of the wonderful acoustics of the building the organ sounds much larger than 13 ranks. One now has the option of using super and sub couplers on the present electric console. The Adam Stein most likely had a Swell to Great 8', Swell to Pedal 8', and Great to Pedal 8'. A Swell to Great Octaves coupler may also have been part of the original specification.
