Residence Organs

From North and East: Drive south on the Capital Beltway to Branch Avenue (Route 5) in the direction of Waldorf. Then drive west on Allentown Road for about 3 traffic lights to a right onto Brinkley Road. Drive through the traffic light at Temple Hill Road. The second left after Temple Hill Road in Farmer Drive. Unity Presbyterian Church is on the corner. Driving up Farmer Drive, the Birckner House is the second private residence on the same side of the road as Unity Presbyterian Church. Park in the half circle or along the street or in the drive way leading to the garage.

From West and South: Cross over the Potomac River on the Wilson Bridge using the Capital Beltway. Exit the Capital Beltway using Exit 4A. Drive straight through 2 traffic lights turning left onto Brinkley Road beside Sharper's Greenhouses. Continue on Brinkley Road and drive past a shopping center in the valley. Drive another mile until you arrive at Unity Presbyterian Church at the corner of Farmer Drive and Brinkley Road. Turn right onto Farmer Drive. Drive up the hill and 6606 Farmer Drive is on your left.

Hamilton Presbyterian Church 5532 Harford Road Baltimore, Maryland 21214

M.P. Möller (1962) Opus 9633

On a bright and beautiful day in April, members of the Hilbus Chapter gathered at Hamilton Presbyterian Church to see Opus 9633 built in 1962 by M.P. Möller. Hamilton is in the northeast section of Baltimore City. As we gathered in the sanctuary of the church we quickly learned that the pipe organ had not been played for two years and that is why the switch at the organ console did not turn the instrument on. After finding some church members we inquired about the electrical boxes and where they were located. After flipping a few switches the organ turned on. The church presently worships with a small Wurlitzer Grand Piano and uses some other instruments including a drum set. The organ was in very good tune and members of the chapter played this 12 rank instrument. It was typical of the early 1960's instruments built by Möller in that it was versatile and the voicing was acceptable. The Great Grave Mixture of 2 ranks in my opinion could have been voiced quieter to blend more with the Great Principal 8 and the Octave 4. The console was a drawknob console with the coupler rail located above the Swell manual.

Church of the Messiah, Episcopal 5801 Harford Road Baltimore, Maryland 21214

Casavant Fréres Ltée Opus 2324, 1956 3 manual and pedal



After lunch at the Greek owned restaurant Valentino's, members of the Hilbus chapter drove a few blocks to the Church of the Messiah, Episcopal. This church is a stately structure on Harford Road. The church had a 1908 Estey Pipe Organ, Opus 567 and the Estey salesperson sold other Estev Pipe Organs to churches in 1908 around Baltimore including St. David's Episcopal and Church of the Savior, Episcopal. Stories have circulated that the Church of the Messiah replaced their Estey Pipe Organ with a new Casavant after one of the facade pipes of the Estev fell down and struck a choir member on the head. When Jim Barrett was organist choirmaster in the 1980's at the Church of the Messiah, it was well known that he had taken a "can opener" to the pipes and made some changes. In 2013 the Columbia Organ Works of Columbia, Pennsylvania did a complete restoration of the organ which included releathering and a solid state control system for the console. Also included were new drawknobs, pistons, and a new pedal board. The console was moved in the sanctuary to conform with the recent renovations of the sanctuary so that the altar could be brought forward and closer to the congregation. The sound of the full organ is very thrilling and blossoms once you walk out into the congregational pews. The mixtures on the swell and great are now both 4 ranks. A Tierce 1 and 3/5' and a Twelfth 2 2/3' have been added to the great. The current organist-choirmaster is James Gautsch. James I believe works for Columbia Organ Works (at least he is listed as a organ technician on their website). Many thanks to Tom Boesch, junior warden, who met and welcomed us to the church.






