Organ Crawl, Saturday, October 28, 2017 – Visit to Warrenton, VA

The Hilbus Chapter's October crawl brought us to Warrenton, VA. The day began with beautiful sunny weather, which, along with the fall foliage (though the colors were somewhat muted this year), contributed to the delight of visiting this charming Northern Virginia town just off Route 29.

In the morning we visited St. James' Episcopal Church, 73 Culpeper St., Warrenton, VA 20186. The parish's Director of Music was unable to be present, but Anne Timberlake, organist at nearby Warrenton Presbyterian Church, graciously stepped in giving us access to church and organ. At first, this writer, along with Carolyn Booth, Gerald Piercey, and Gordon Biscomb, waited outside the church wondering if this was to be the sum total of participants for the crawl, but once inside the church, our numbers quickly swelled to seventeen – a wonderful turnout!

Like many churches Hilbus Chapter visits, St. James has a history of past organs leading up to the present one. The first organ we have documentation for was a Möller, their Opus 3463 built in 1922. It was a two-manual of 19 ranks retaining pipework from a previous organ. This was subsequently rebuilt by Möller as Opus R-832 in 1970 with tonal changes, several new ranks, and a new three-manual console. Positiv and Antiphonal divisions were prepared for. For those interested, the OHS Database has stop-lists for the 1922 and 1970 organs.

In 1989, Randall Dyer & Associates of Jefferson City, TN was contracted to add the Positiv and Antiphonal divisions along with minor changes to the existing Great, Swell, and Pedal. In 2010 they were again contracted, this time to replace the Möller pitman chests with electro-pneumatic slider-and-pallet chests, update the instrument to solid-state control, and add several new ranks of pipes.

The main organ is located on the right side of the chancel with the console opposite, and the Antiphonal is situated at the back of the nave. Exposed pipework of the Positiv sits attractively at the front of the instrument, and the





Antiphonal pipework is likewise exposed. Some of the larger pipes are of aluminum, including the Pedal 16' Principal, new in 2010.


Mr. Dyer has successfully achieved a warm, flexible and colorful sounding instrument in a space with less than live acoustics. He seems to have intuitively known how far to push the sound without going over the edge.

In the current stop-list of 2010 that follows, many of the stops shown as "existing" are pipes put in by Dyer in 1989, as well as some Möller material from the 1970 project. Mr. Dyer does not believe any pipework remains from 1922 or earlier.



Following lunch we visited Warrenton Presbyterian Church, 91 Main Street, Warrenton, VA 22186. This church boasts two pipe organs and a Bosendorfer grand piano (with bass extension, 9 extra keys extending down to CCCC).

The "historic" church, built in 1855 and witness to occupancy by Union troops from 1861-1865, had a small Möller, Opus 1934 previous to the present organ. It was built in 1912 for a church in DC and bought second-hand by WPC in 1932. It was a two-manual duplex design (most stops common to both manuals) with tubular pneumatic action and consisted of 8' Open Diapason (Great & Pedal only), 8' Stopped Diapason, 8' Dulciana, 8' Unda Maris (TC, Swell only), 4' Flute Harmonique, 8' Oboe Gamba, and Pedal 16' Bourdon.

The present organ, located in the rear balcony, is a ten-stop mechanical action organ built by Fritz Noack in 1974, their Opus 75. It features a detached reverse console directly in front of the free-standing case housing the pipework. Tonal highlights include a delightfully robust plenum and gorgeous flutes.

In 1999, a new sanctuary was added along with a two-manual Randall Dyer & Associates pipe organ, and the Bosendorfer grand mentioned earlier.

The organ is situated behind the choir in a shallow chamber to the front right of the square-shaped sanctuary. The façade pipes are from the Pedal Principal and Choralbass and are constructed of aluminum. Like its sister instrument at St. James, this organ utilizes slider-and-pallet wind chests. While a seemingly modest stop-list on paper, this organ has an effective array of tonal possibilities. It projects clearly into the room, and offers flexibility and color for a variety of accompanying and repertoire needs.
